# **1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

---

## **1.1 INTRODUCTION**

To bring into the main stream of education the Kisan Vidya Prasarak Sanstha had established Kisan Arts, Commerce and Science College Parola in 1976 by the founder chairman Late MLA Appasaheb Bhaskarrao Rajaram Patil.

To initiate the vision and mission of the founder member the institute was working to strengthen the needy generation of peasant, landless workers and poor downtrodden inhabitants of the neighboring area students. The infrastructure of the college is developed among 2.16 acre of the campus. The college has developed well-equipped laboratories, individual departments, Research laboratories, library, gymnasium, sports ground etc. College has adopted ICT based methodologies teaching, learning and evaluation. There are six ICT classrooms and seminar hall.

The Institute offers various programs such as Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Commerce, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Vocational Courses. College also runs 4 COC courses to enhance the skill ability amongst the students. Form the academic year 2022-23, the Government of Maharashtra has also allowed to run 04 Post Graduate Courses to the institute. The K.B.C.N.M.U. Jalgaon has too recognized two P.G. Research Laboratories for Geography and Chemistry. The Institute has been committed to provide quality education to irrespective of all classes of the society especially to the deprived and weaker section of the neighboring area students the lowest cost.

To imbibe cultural, ethical, extra-curricular potential the college implements various programmes through NSS, NCC, Yuvati Sabha, Student Development, Sports etc. College organizes activities such as annual social gathering, poster presentation, debate, quiz, field visits, career guidance etc.

To aim the life-long learning activities among the staff, the college and IQAC encourage the staff to participate actively in orientation course, FDP, refresher courses, seminar, workshops, research activities etc. Among 38 teaching faculties 25 teachers have been awarded Ph. D. degree. One of the teaching and non teaching faculty member received university level best teacher award and best non teaching award respectively.

IQAC plays an important role in facilitating teaching learning process towards quality substance and enhancement. The campus is environmentally consciousness and undertakes the green practices.

### **Institutional Strength**

- Proactive and dynamic Management, well-disciplined learning environment.
- The college has well-furnished multi-storied infrastructure, well-equipped and well-furnished laboratories for the subjects.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays an important role in the planning, monitoring, augmentation and sustenance of the overall quality enhancement of the college.
- Dedicated, experienced and well qualified, well trained academic faculty.
- College offers variety of programs including 12 UG, 4 PG, 7 Ph D and 6 Certificate programs.
- College has introduced Skill based courses of B. Voc. Software Development and Soil water conservation.
- College is having good IT infrastructure and the entire campus is under CCTV surveillance.
- Good Research culture, College has 2 recognized Research Laboratories, 11 Ph. D. guides, with research outcome of 139 research articles and 10 Ph. D. awarded.
- College has conducted various national, international, seminar, workshops and conferences.
- Strong N.S.S., N.C.C., Yuwati Sabha, and Student Welfare Department units, social extension activities through various cultural programmes.
- Good academic result, average result is 67.5% in last five years.
- Around 350 students selected for various defense services such as Army, BSF, SRP, Police, CRPF etc.
- Various quality audits such as green, energy and academic audits are carried out.

### **Institutional Weakness**

- Lack of 100% recruitment in the aided section of the college due to Government policies.
- Being rural student's limitations to participate in more co-curricular and extension activities.
- Lack of job opportunities at local level.
- English language barrier for students. Progression of students' gets affected due to poor language skills.
- Lack of basic exposure to students about IT skills, soft skills and cultural skills.
- Poor financial conditions of parents prevent the students from joining vocational & certificate courses.
- Lack of fund contributions from alumni, philanthropists and NGO's and little participation of alumnae hinder the overall development of the College.
- Few research projects.

### **Institutional Opportunity**

- Scope for Inter-institutional student exchange programs and industry linkages.
- To start more Add on / Carrier Oriented Courses to provide job opportunity.
- Scope to start more Certificate Courses in English to develop oral and written soft skills.
- More community linked extension activities should be implemented.
- Scope to organize more gender sensitization programmes and women empowerment programs.
- Arranging more professional training programmes for teaching and non-teaching staff.

- Scope to initiate Entrepreneurship Development Cell and organize activities for students development.
- To enhance the activities of coaching to students for competitive examination.

### **Institutional Challenge**

- Government policies to fill up the teaching and non-teaching post.
- All Post Graduate and some UG programs are permanently self-financed.
- To overcome dropout due to lack of family and social background.
- To start professional skill development courses on no grant basis.
- Being located in rural area, there are difficulties in collaborating with industrial and other institutions of repute.
- Paucity of non-salary grants and other funds, there is a constraint and challenges for expansion of infrastructure.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

The college is being affiliated to Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon, the curricular aspects are aligned in accordance with the guidelines and framework of the university. At the beginning of the academic year institutes prepares academic calendar every year. While preparing the academic calendar all the activities are included such as curricular, co-curricular, internal assessment etc. For effective delivery of the curriculum each faculty member prepares their annual teaching plan of their respective courses. IQAC ensures the effective delivery of curriculum.

Institution being affiliated to KBC North Maharashtra University follows the curriculum prescribed by the university. All the programmes offered by the institute are of CBCS pattern which provides academic flexibility to the students. College runs 04 certificate courses, syllabus of these courses are designed by the college with a view to add skills and enhance employability of the students. College also runs 02 B. Voc. Skill oriented degree programme.

The curriculum is enriched with cross cutting issues like ethics gender, human values, environment and sustainability. The curriculum offers space for integrating cross-cutting issues relevant to gender, environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics. The college undertakes various activities to involve the students in social initiatives and outreach activities.

All the first year students are compulsory assigned project works of Environmental Studies. It includes projects on topic pollution, global warming, etc. Field works are assigned to the students of B.A. / B.Sc. /B.com and B. Voc. The college organizes field trips to make the students familiar with environment awareness.

The college has a structured system for collecting feedback from all the stakeholders, to take it to the appropriate action after its analysis. Every year feedback has been collected in an online mode. The analyzed feedback and action taken reports are displayed on the institutional website.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The institute serves the educational needs of the students of all sectors. The average enrolment percentage of the institute during the last five years is 68.16%. The institute strictly follows reservation policy of central/state government accordingly average percentage of seats filled against reserved categories is 100. In the institution there is sufficient number of teachers, as a result the ratio of teacher- student is 1:33.

The college has students from diverse backgrounds, to teach this heterogeneous group of students, the college has adapted varied pedagogies such as experiential teaching-learning, participative learning and problem solving methods. College organizes field visits, excursions, hands on training, poster presentations and assigns project work etc. College promotes participative learning in which students actively participate in activities such as: classroom seminars, group discussions, participation in debates questioning/quiz method. Learning experience of students increased due to use of ICT integration in teaching learning process. It has also help the institution to improve and increase the quality, accessibility and cost efficiency of the delivery of instructions to students. During pandemic period teachers have been used ICT tools more effectively using various platforms likewise Zoom, Google Meet, Google classroom, Teachmint etc. The IQAC has established Mentor-Mentee system with ratio of **1:33**. Around 76 percent of the teachers are filled against the sanction posts. Presently there are 70 percent faculties members are having Ph. D. / NET / SET.

To ensure the effective examination mechanism there is an internal examination committee looks after effective monitoring and timely implementation of the internal examination and procedure of evaluation. External examination and evaluation is conducted by affiliating university. Student grievances related to examination form submission, hall ticket, change of subject, mark sheet etc. are addressed at college and university level in time-bound manner.

The institution has well defined programme and course outcomes which are evaluated through internal and external examination and various curricular and extra co-curricular activities organized in the institute. The progress of the pass students has increased significantly as a result of student centric methods for teaching learning process. Average pass percentage ratio has been increased upto 67.85%.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

The institute has been playing a proactive role in promoting research culture. For this purpose, Research Committee has been established which monitors the progress of all research activities in college. It plays a pivotal role in inculcating research aptitude among students and teachers. Out of 38 faculties, 25 have been completed their Ph.D. and remaining are registered. Chemistry and Geography departments having recognized research laboratories and 11 faculties are research guide in the campus. During last five years 10 students completed Ph. D degree and 8 are enrolled. 2 Ph. D. students, have been awarded Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Research fellowship by the Government of Maharashtra. Six research projects have been sanctioned from various funding agencies including ICSSR, New Delhi. Out of these, five research projects have been completed and one is ongoing. The institute has conducted 13 number of workshops, seminars, webinar and conferences during the assessment period.

Taking into consideration the need and value of research, the faculty members are always motivated to publish their research papers in reputed international journals, as a result, the faculty members have published 139 research papers in UGC recognized/Care listed/ refereed/peer-reviewed journals. 70 conference papers and book chapters have been published/presented in International, National, and State level seminars and conferences. In order to inculcate research aptitude among students and prepare them for participating in Avishkar Research Project Competition.

The college is actively participated in extension activities through NSS volunteers and NCC cadets to help society by its service. Institute organizes blood donation camp on 8th September every year. During last five years NSS and NCC arranged tree plantation, street play, rallies, Vrukshdindi, AIDS awareness, legal awareness program with civil court of Parola. During pandemic NSS unit has distributed masks, sanitizers, food for needy peoples etc. The institute has organized vaccination awareness campaign and vaccination camp twice. NSS volunteers gave their service at Government Cottage Hospital for one month during pandemic. This work was recognized by various government and other bodies with appreciation letter/certificates, awards and honors. The institute has signed MoUs with 6 various recognized institutions and industries for collaboration.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The institution ensures adequate infrastructure and physical facilities. There are three main buildings labeled as A- wing, B-wing and C-Wing. These wings having sufficient number of classrooms, laboratories, ICT classrooms, seminar hall, multi facilitated gymnasium, library, girls common room, lavatory facilities for boys and girls and play ground for organizing sports events. To organize cultural activities like annual social gathering college has various musical instrument and stage to perform activities.

Institute is having spacious laboratories for Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Geography, Soil and Water Conservations, Software Development, Computer Science, Commerce and Management etc. All these laboratories are having all essential equipments e.g. PC based UV spectrophotometer, Ultrasound interferometer, Ultrasonic probe sonicator, double distillation assembly, flame photometer, muffle furnace, and photocatalytic reactor, automatic weather station, plane table survey sets, GPS etc.

Institute continuously tries to increase its infrastructure facility therefore spends sufficient amount of fund to development of infrastructure. At the beginning of financial year provision is being made in annual budget every year. Institute has incurred expenditure on infrastructure up to 25 to 30% and 50 to 60% on academic and physical facilities of the total expenditure every year.

Library is a well-stocked and automated with Master soft's LIBMAN- Library Management System. Institute library having a book collection of 30863 Books, and 28 journals and 8 newspaper subscribed. There is a reading room for students which can accommodate around 50 students. Library has been subscribed N-LIST Database since 2012. Library has UGC knowledge resource center has 10 computers with internet facility. Library includes facilities such as OPAC facility for books searching, QR codes for some books, QR code for library visitors etc.

Institute updates its IT infrastructure frequently. The college upgraded its IT facilities as per the needs and requirements during the last five years with computers, Scanners, printers, photocopy and LCD projector etc. The college has upgraded internet connection bandwidth from 20 Mbps to 200 Mbps. The college has 6 ICT enable classrooms and seminar hall. Computer science, Software Development and Commerce and Management laboratories are having enough number of computer systems. College campus is under CCTV surveillance.

### **Student Support and Progression**

Students are the primary stakeholders of the institution and the institution has been evolving measures like student empowerment, inclusive practices and skill development which are student-supportive and student

centric. The practice of social inclusion, financial incentives and welfare measures has been internalized in the institutional processes.

The college ensures prompt application and disbursement of SC/ST/OBC/Minority scholarship provided by the State Government and the Government of India. Financial assistance is also given by college Staff members to the needy students under Kisan Poor Student Welfare Scheme (KPSWS).

The institute follows a mentoring system in which around thirty students are assigned to each faculty member. The mentors will meet the students periodically and monitor their performance and their progress. The consistent academic and other support to students in competitive exams have also increased resulting in admissions into higher educational institutions. Institute make arrangement of various capacity building programmes such as Swyamsiddha Abhiyan, workshops for language communication, Yoga workshop, IIRS courses for the development of ICT computing skill.

Several co-curricular, extra-curricular activities are organized every year like annual social gathering, NSS and NCC extension activities, sports at zonal and university level, student welfare cells are facilitate holistic development of the students and emerge as socially matured individuals. Several students have excelled in sports at national level and having won prizes, representing state and university in various competitions. The institution has career guidance cell to guide and motivate students for various competitive examination preparation. The college magazine and department newsletters have encouraged students to show their creative skills by writing articles on contemporary developments catering to social, educational, economical and other areas.

The institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances. Students are represented in several academic and administrative bodies/committees of the institution. The committees are Discipline Committee, Anti ragging committee, IQAC, Sexual Harassment committee etc. Alumni Association is functional in the college which is registered to charity commissioner, in the name of "Alumni Welfare Association, Parola Tal. Parola Dist. Jalgaon". Alumni Association contributes in the development of the institution through financial and non-financial initiatives.

## **Governance, Leadership and Management**

To bring into the educational mainstream of the nation to rural area students of Parola tehsil, Late MLA Appasaheb Bhaskarrao Rajaram Patil had established Kisan Arts, Commerce and Science College under the aegis of Kisan Vidya Prasarak Sanstha in the year 1976. Presently, Ex MLA and Minister of State Dr. Satish Bhaskarrao Patil is heading the society adjunct with the Board of Directors under the guided vision of founder chairman. They are social activists who have shown their concerns and commitments for the socio, economic, cultural development of this region through proactive intervention. Accordingly education has been considered as a strong intervening instrument for development and upliftment of this region. The college works with a sense of commitment and helping the students by providing education in remote, rural as well as women section of the society with an aim to empower them by inculcating, educational, human values, life skills, and living skills enabling them to live meaningful life. The governance of the institution is reflective in its vision and mission of the institution. The organization allows the representation of people drawn from society, academia and social activists engage in different domains of the KVP Sanstha and in institution.

The selection process of teaching and non-teaching staff are carried out as per the set norms and procedures laid down by Govt. of Maharashtra and Affiliating University. The institution takes care of the welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff such as medical reimbursement, group insurance and credit society. The members of the teaching and non-teaching staff are apprised on regular basis. The college has regular internal and external financial audit. The College has been getting financial support from University Grants Commission for infrastructural facilities and 100% financial support from Govt. of Maharashtra for salary and pension. For other requirements the management of the college is striving for mobilizing funds for the developmental activities of the campus.

IQAC has been performing its active role since 2005 and making sincere efforts in implementing the quality mandate as evolved by the academic bodies. The college reviews on a continuous basis, its teaching-learning process, methodologies and learning outcomes through IQAC.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The Institution provides a safe and secure atmosphere for students. All campus is covered under CCTV surveillance. Institute organizes gender equity programs such as Women Empowerment, Lecture on Laws protecting Women, Self-Défense Training Camp, and Personality Development Workshop for Girls, etc. The college has implemented security and safety measures, especially for girls. The College has common room for girls. The girls' common room is equipped with sanitary napkins vending and a disposal machine. Events for promoting truth, love, non-violence, peace, and honesty are being organized. The Institution organizes the birth and death anniversaries of great personalities / heroes to imbibe ideals among students.

The Institution uses LED tubes to save power. The Campus is endowed with greenery. Solid and e-waste management system is working as per the norms. Rainwater harvesting system has been implemented. Most of the students and staff members make use of public transport to reach college. The college tries its best towards a paperless office. Facilities for differently abled students with divyangjan-friendly toilets, wheel chair, etc. are provided in the college.

In order to fulfill our commitment to social responsibilities the college has conducted several activities on regular basis in the neighbourhood community. To keep a green and healthy campus "No Vehicle Day" is followed on every Wednesday. The college has conducted Green and Energy Audit as a green campus healthy campus initiative.

The college has initiated two best practices such as "Blood Donation: Learning to connect to society through Education" and Kisan Students Welfare Scheme". To create patriotism and social awareness among students the college celebrates festivals like Republic day and Independence day. The NCC Parade is organized by the Cadets on the occasion of Republic Independence Day. The College celebrates Constitution Day, International Yoga Day, World Women's Day, World Environment Day, and International AIDS Day for patriotic zeal. The institution has a code of conduct for students and others to ensure academic discipline. The core values have been displayed in the institution at prominent places and also on its website. The College attempts to socio-economic upliftment of students through quality education to achieve distinctiveness.

##### **1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment**

##### **Response:**

As per norms of Kavyatri Bhainabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon academic calendar is prepared every year at the beginning of academic year. IQAC plays an important role in the planning of academic calendar includes all aspects related to the students for their development. Academic calendar clears the way of teaching, learning and evaluation procedure. Teaching process includes theory, practical's, field work, Industrial visits and field visits for academic development of student. IQAC collects annual teaching plans from all faculty members at the beginning of academic year and review of the same regarding completion of syllabus took during the staff meeting under the chairmanship of Principal.

At the beginning of the academic year Heads of department call the meeting with their staff members to discuss departmental activities, syllabus, assignment of the workload to individual teachers. For the convenience of all stakeholders, academic calendar is posted on the college website and on notice board. For the admission process teaching plan, real teaching days, holidays, university exams and other co-curricular programs, the college follow the academic calendar.

During lockdown period of COVID-19, the lectures were organised by online mode with different platform like Zoom, Google meet, Google classroom, Teach mint, YouTubechannel etc. IQAC ensures effective curriculum delivery of the courses though continuous monitoring. Evaluation of student is carried out by conducting internal examination, tutorials, group discussion and making models.

Internal examination is conducted according to the guideline issued by Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon for every academic year. Institute level internal examination committee is constituted every year comprises one member of each faculty and committee is coordinated by senior faculty member. Part of continuous evaluation of the students as per university guidelines, institute conducts two internal test for each semester, 1st test for 10 marks, 2nd test for 20 and 10 marks are given for the overall behaviour of the student, approach of the students and attendance performers. First test is conducted after completion about 40 % syllabuses. While 2nd test conduct after completion of entire syllabus. The subject in charge should make sure that, there should be adequate time gap between the two tests. During COVID-19 period the internal examination were conducted in an online mode through the Google classroom / Google forms.

In the classroom, every teacher shows evaluated answer sheets to each students for their clarification about the answers.If some of the students remain absent due to certain genuine reason like participation in sports, competitive exams, Avishkar, medical emergency or any other college activities; the each concerned department conducts their internal tests separately and their internal marks are being displayed on the notice board. The concern subject teacher submits internal marks to the university via e-savidha portal of the university.

<b>1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum</b>
<b>Response:</b>
We are catering to the rural masses efforts are being taken to integrate the various cross cutting issues through the curriculum by the university and through add-on courses, supporting activities etc. by the

college. Being an affiliated college, the institute meticulously follows the curriculum prescribed by the university. The university integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment, Sustainability, Human Values and Professional ethics into the curriculum. Following are the details of the courses which integrate cross-cutting issues into the curriculum.

The syllabus taught in the college is prepared by KBC North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. The components planned in the curriculum are used for holistic development of the students, environmental awareness and upholding of social values. B. A. First year Marathi and English subject study sequence includes stories depicting social awareness, human values and life struggles. These stories can create depth in students' thinking by making them aware of social harmony as well as social disparity. B.A. first year Political Science course provides a comprehensive introduction to the Constitution of India. Due to this course, the fundamental rights of the Indian people, their duties and empowerment of all castes and tribes and women, their rights have been discussed. Also, tribal tribes, labor movement, Dalit movement and women's movement are studied in first year history course. This course helps to inculcate human values in the students. B.A. second year Geography curriculum covers population geography. This course covers social, economic sustainable development also emphasis is placed on the need for sustainable development and implementation. Similarly, religion, agriculture. Communication, education, gender equality and government schemes are studied in terms of population distribution.

In the commerce faculty, course of the subject, various trade and taxation laws in India are taught under the subject of Business and Taxation Law. It also helps to inculcate legal ethics in students through important topics like consumer protection and business ethics, patent act. After completing the education sequence, the students use this subject in practical work.

Environment has been given an important place in the syllabus. Environmental science is taught as compulsory subject for first year B.A., B. Com., B.Sc. and B. Voc. Students so as to aware about the environment. Also on various topic students prepare project on environment science. A separate subject of Environmental Geography is taught in the third year course of Geography. Ecosystem, environmental sustainability, environmental policy is studied. A separate paper on Renewable Energy and Energy Harvesting is taught in B.Sc. Semester Four. It studies non-conventional energy sources like solar energy, ocean energy, hydro energy, wind energy, geothermal energy etc. Many activities related to environmental protection are taken up in the college through the Department of Geography. Through NSS, NCC, environmental awareness is created through street drama. Also ambitious activities like tree plantation and conservation are implemented. No Vehicle Day is observed on every Wednesday to create environmental awareness among the students and teachers. During special NSS winter camps lecture on eminent personalities have been organized every year to deliver lectures on social and ethical issue.

- Department of Commerce organizes visits to Banks, Credit Societies and Cooperative organizations in order to improve financial literacy and accounting skills.
- Participation of students in the organizing committee of various events such as Constitution Day, Democracy week, National voter's day, Women's Day, Geography Week, Marathi Language Fortnight, encyclopedia reading etc.

#### *Participative learning*

This is the best student-centric learning method, in which students actively participate in activities such as:

- Research projects
- Wall paper: "AksharSetu"
- Science exhibitions
- GPS Mapping
- Study of Flora and Fauna/ Sample Collections
- Poster Presentation .
- "Budget PeCharcha" etc. are being practiced along with the regular teaching.

### ***Problem Solving Method***

Problem solving methodologies are intended to make the students take responsibilities, solve problems, resolve conflicts and find alternatives. It promotes critical thinking, creativity and scientific temperament. Departments like, Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Mathematics and Computers are using this method successfully for enhancing the learning experiences of the students. As a part of curriculum projects are being assigned to the students of aforementioned departments and the students of environment science course which incorporates problem solving methods. Students are promoted for identification and selection of the problems, to plan hypothesis, monitoring of experimental protocol and to approach towards expected conclusion.

### ***ICT Tools for enhancing learning process:***

The College has continuously been promoting ICT based campus by providing required computer and modern tools to impart quality education among the rural area students. Teachers from various departments have also upgraded their ICT based skill during the Covid-19 Period. To enhance students learning experience more effectively the institutional administration has sanctioned well equipped computer labs, 10 LCD Projectors and e-sources library etc.

To promote and support e-learning experiences the college staff has also upgrade themselves with the developing world. To get effective use of ICT tools various training programs and workshops, sponsored by the PMMMNMT-MHRD, SWAYAM, NPTEL etc., attended by the teachers. During the period of Covid-19 it helps to deliver the online lectures effectively through various online platforms. The academic calendar was also moulded as per present scenario and the UGC and state government guidelines for the particular time.

### 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

**Response:**

The college has formed an Examination Committee for the mechanism of internal/ External assessment and time-bound grievance redressal smoothly. It includes senior teaching faculties and well-acquainted teachers along with clerical staffs to inspect internal/ external examination activities. The committee is

continuously in contact with the web-portal of K.B.C North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon to locate well-in-advance all the circular of examination and internal assessment. That information is also communicated within stipulated time to all the concern administrative staff, teachers and students. All the university circulars are displayed on the notice board as well as it is also communicated by the teachers to their respective classes. All the queries are solved under the college level grievance channel.

### **Internal/External Redressal:**

As per the guidelines and CBCS Patterns of the advocated by the university, the college implements 60- 40 patterns for the evaluation of the students.

40 Marks: Internal Evaluation (includes as attendance & behavior, Test 1 & Test 2, Seminar, Group Discussion and Tutorials etc.)

All the guidelines are followed by the Committee members and teachers.

During the lockdown due to pandemic as per UGC, State Government and University regulations, the college has conducted online internal / Oral/ Practical examinations through online platform.

To conduct University Examination smoothly, the constituted examination committee works actively on the following agenda:

- Circulate various university circular and time-table among the student.
- Also ensure all the preparation regarding examination in well and advance to avoid certain problems.
- The college has formed IT Co-Ordinator Committee during Covid-19 Period to resolve queries in online examination.

### **Grievance Redressal System:**

To increase the efficiency to resolve the grievances of the students smoothly, the college has defined two different channels. One is related to college level queries and another is for university grievances.

### **College Level Grievances:**

All grievances related to the internal assessment are primarily redressed by the respective heads of the departments. In some unsatisfied cases, they are forwarded to the examination committee (if required).

- Seeking permission for Internal examination for less than 80% attendance.
- To allow for re-examination in case of unavoidable reasons.
- Doubts and queries regarding Internal examination or assessment.
- Any grievances regarding practical work are immediately resolved by the respective teacher and the

head of the department.

### University Level Grievances:

In case of any university related grievance, applications in prescribed forms are collected and forwarded to the concerned authorities. The grievances of the students related to examinations such as:

- If students have any doubts, examination department helps to ask for photocopy of answer sheets as per the stipulated guidelines.

process of an institution. The academic progress of the students is regularly monitored by subject teachers as well as respective Heads of Departments for effective program outcomes attainments. The college ensures the outcome of the programs through the analysis of the internal and external examination results and achievements in the placements, sports, cultural and extension activities. The NSS and NCC units of the college organize various community-oriented activities. These efforts help to instill socio-ethical values and develop community service attitude among the students. The assessment tools and processes used for measuring the attainment of each PO's, PSO's and CO's are direct and indirect methods. ### 3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

**3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge**

**Response:**

The transition from a traditional college to a modern and digitally driven Arts, Commerce and Science college begins with the creation of an Innovation ecosystem. Innovation and research is the mainstay for the sustainable development of nation and educational institute has to play vital role for the same. In order to create the research environment, an ecosystem must be developed in the institute. In this regards our college has been constituted, Research Committee (RC) and Research Advisory committee (RAC) as per guidelines laid by Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon to monitor research activity in the college. RC encourages the faculty members to carry out the research activities in the college, including participation in the conferences, workshops and submitting research articles as well as research proposal to various agencies.

In the last five years our faculty members have been published *one hundred thirty nine* research papers in UGC care list, Scopus, Web of Science, peer reviewed journal as well as *seventy* numbers of books, book chapters, and conference proceedings. During this assessment period 6 number of research projects have been sanctioned by various funding agencies like UGC, ICSSR, KBCNMU etc. to the faculty members of the institution. The various departments in our college arranged *thirteen* numbers of national conference, international conference, workshop, webinar during the assessment period. Recently, Chemistry department has organized national webinar on intellectual rights and Geography department hosted for the

syllabus reframing workshop for the FYBSc geography subject in the affiliating university. The RC also motivates the students as well as faculties to participate in the Avishkar competition held every year, quiz competitions, science competition.

Our management motivates to carry out research activities in the college and RAC is back bone of it. Out of thirty eight permanent faculties *twenty five* have been completed their doctoral degree. Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon recognized *eleven* faculties as a research guide as well as *six* faculties recognized as a Post Graduate teacher. The chemistry and geography departments are recognized research laboratories in the college by affiliating university. The byproduct of this is that *ten* have been completed their doctoral degree during last five years and *eight* number of students are enrolled for the Ph.D. Two registered Ph. D. students have been awarded ***Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Research fellowship*** by the government of Maharashtra.

RAC monitors progress of research of students which are enrolled for PhD in the college by taking meeting twice in a year. In these meetings research students gives presentation and discusses their research activity during last six months with the RAC. The committee member solves the difficulties of the students and approves six monthly progress reports to be submitted to the affiliating university as per guideline suggested by UGC, New Delhi.

### 3.4 Extension Activities

**Response:**

Infrastructure of the Institution has three buildings as A- wing, B-Wing and, C-Wing having total built up area of 45861.26 Sq. Ft. with a sufficient playground having total area of 2.16 acres. The College is having 18 classrooms, separate spacious laboratories for Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Geography, Commerce and Management, Soil and Water Conservations, Software Development, and, Computer Science with adequate facilities required for the Teaching-Learning process. College is having two recognized research laboratories for subjects Chemistry and Geography. All the departments are provided with computers, printers and broadband internet facilities. Broadband internet facilities are also available in Library, Commerce laboratory, Computer Laboratory and Software Development laboratory for students. The institution has 6 ICT classrooms and ICT facility have been provided in the Commerce laboratory, Geography laboratory, Soil and Water conservation and Software Development laboratory and Seminar hall with internet broadband connection.

The institute has well equipped laboratories. In chemistry laboratory PC based UV spectrophotometer, Ultrasound interferometer; Ultrasonic probe sonicator, double distillation assembly, flame photometer, muffle furnace, and photocatalytic reactor etc. are available. Botany laboratory is having a biological charts, plant preservative jars and research microscope for effective teaching process. The institution also having botanical garden in which different plant species are available. Zoology laboratory having instruments, charts, museum and preserved specimens are available. Geography research laboratory having instruments like dumpy level, topographical maps, Automatic weather station, plane table survey sets, prismatic compass sets, GPS, software global mapper is available, Mirror Stereoscope, Aerial Photographs, Indian clinometers, Abney level, various types of Globes etc.

In the institution Commerce laboratory having 32 desktop computers, Software Development laboratory having 32 computers and the Computer science laboratory having 16 computers available for students. The institute is having UGC- Knowledge Resource Center for a student is available in the Library. Xerox & Student consumer store, canteen is also available for students. Actively NSS, NCC unit is working in the institute and which is helpful to students to become good citizens. Institute encourages the students to develop cultural activity within them for that institute provide musical instrument, sound system and separate hall which help them to participate in different programs organized by university, and college gathering events like plays, mimes, skits, craft, rangoli, debating, street play, etc.

Institute provides adequate facilities for sports. The college has sufficient playground with an area of 2.16 Acer. Well equipped multi-gymnasium having Station gym, weight training set, Foot rod piece, Dumbbells and Plates, Exercise cycle, Weight training set etc. College motivates students to participate in different sports by providing sports kits, traveling allowance, dearness allowance and tracksuits for winners. Multigym is well equipped. Institute is having wheel chair, ramp facility for divyang students. There is separate drinking water tank having 8000 liters capacity.

In 2021 library Purchased updated software i.e. Master soft LIBMAN- Library Management System. The LAN including Libraries and e-facilities are available to access e-resources (eBooks and e-journals). Internet facility is made available freely to the staff and students. All the staff and students have access to vast e-resources available under N-List and e-journals subscribed by the college.

Library has a book collection of 30863 Books, and 28 journals and 8 newspaper subscribed. Library using ILMS (Integrated Library Management Software). System having the Cloud based server and Web based software is being installed for Library automation. The library can accommodate over 50 students in reading room. Library has been Subscribed N-LIST Data base since 2012. N-List database provided More than 3 Lakhs eBooks and 6000 e-Journals. The library has 10 N-computing computers with internet facility. Library also have OPAC facility is available for books searching.

In the academic year 2017-18, 23 journals were subscribed and spent amount Rs. 15625-00, in 2018-2021 there are 19 journal and periodical were subscribed. 2021-2022, 28 journals are subscribed and spent amount Rs. 66372=00.

## 4.3 IT Infrastructure

### 4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection

#### Response:

The college has provides computers with printer, scanner and internet facilities to office, library and various departments. The college upgraded its IT facilities as per the needs and requirements during the last five years. These IT facilities are ensures students and faculties to keep themselves update in every field of knowledge. The college has upgraded internet connection bandwidth from 20 Mbps to 200 Mbps from 2016 to 2021. Now in 2022 college has three broadband connections with 100 Mbps bandwidth. The college has updated its IT facilities with increasing the number of computers, printers, and scanners, smart boards, interactive LCD projectors, photocopy machines, online admission process, dynamic website, etc. The teaching and learning process is enhanced through incorporating ICT tools and e-resources. INFLIBNET, Video lectures, are exclusively made available to the learners to enhance learning capabilities. The students, teachers and non-teaching staff are also encouraged to use various facilities. In the institution sufficient number of desktop PCs are available for teaching learning process, installed in various laboratories. At present there are 105 PCs with broadband internet connection. For teaching learning process college had five LCD Projectors earlier, now they are increased up to eleven in the last five years. These LCD projectors are installed in the Commerce and Management Laboratory, Software Development Laboratory, Soil and Water Conservation Laboratory, Seminar Hall and different classrooms. The antivirus like Quick Heal are installed in all computers and regularly updated and upgraded. The college has well equipped commerce lab, Knowledge Resource centre and Software development lab. All these labs have computers with internet facility. Our college is an authorized Centre for assessment of theory papers (CAP) of exams conducted by Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University Jalgaon by mode of On Screen Evaluation. For On Screen Evaluation College has organizes the computers with internet connection. Our college faculties as well as nearby other colleges like Rani Laxmibai College Parola, Arts, Commerce and Science College Dharangaon and Sau. Rajanitai Nanasahab Deshmukh Arts Commerce & Science College Bhadgaon faculties were joined to our On Screen Evaluation Centre.

The whole campus of the institution is under CCTV surveillance. There are 20 CCTV cameras are installed in the campus. Principal, vice principal and few teachers continuously monitored the activities.

Admission process in the institution is fully in an online mode using Master Soft cloud based software. Master soft ERP solutions LIBMAN library management software (version 1.0) is the software used in library which is a multiplatform, multilingual, and client server based software. It provides highly versatile and user friendly online public access catalog (OPAC) for simple and advanced search. Library also provides M OPAC to students and faculty members. All the books in the active collection have been bar-coded.

## 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

### Response:

In the administrative set up the Principal is at the helm. The Principal prepares the annual budget in consultation with the faculty and the management. Under the guidance of the Principal, the IQAC cell looks after the task of IQAC. The HODs look after departmental affairs. There are various committees to make teaching-learning process smooth. The College is governed by Kisan Vidya Prasarak Sanstha and affiliated to Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. The institutional leadership has always been participatory. The College Development Committee and IQAC finalize academic, administrative and infrastructural development plans of the college.

### Administrative setup:

The organizational structure consists of the parent body of Kisan Vidya Prasarak Sanstha with the President, Vice President, Directors, and Secretary process effective, to run the college smoothly, and to carry out curricular, co-curricular and extension activities. Apart from the teaching staff, there is

administrative staff to look after the administrative affairs. The I/c registrar works under the supervision of the Principal. The official work such as admission, examination, accounts, and finance are decentralized among the senior clerks. The junior clerk, technical and auxiliary staff works under the guidance of the principal and registrar.

**Appointment and Service Rules:**

The appointment and service rules procedures are followed as per the guidelines framed under Uniform Statutes Section 72 (10) of The Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016, Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon, State Government of Maharashtra and UGC New Delhi. For the promotional policies of non teaching staff Maharashtra Civil Service rules and regulations are followed.

**College Development Committee (CDC):**

At the college level, the College Development Committee (CDC) is an apex body and acts as a link between the Management and the College comprising of Office Bearers of the Management, the Principal, teacher representatives, non-teaching staff representatives, and students’ representative. At the College level, there is an Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC). The Principal is assisted by Vice Principals followed by the Heads of the departments and faculty members. For official matters, the Office Superintendent is assisted to the Senior and Junior clerks, Accountants, and other staff.

**Perspective plan:**

As a post accreditation measure, the college has prepared five-year perspective plan from 2017-18 to 2021-22 immediately after second cycle of accreditation in December 2016 to cater the needs of the students and to expand the academic horizon of the college. Perspective plan helps in a systematic and well thought out implementation of welfare measures in tune with the vision and mission.

## 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

**Response:**

There are a number of welfare measures taken by the Institution for the benefit of teaching and non-teaching staff viz.

- Annual share dividend as per cooperative rules against investment that is more than 12% per annum.
- Group Insurance of Coverage up to Rs. 60000/- with an premium of Rs. 240 to 720 per annum.
- The Management/Institution acknowledges the academic and non-academic achievements of the teaching and non-teaching staff.
- General Provident Fund (GPF) for grantable staff Investment of 10 % of the basic pay with returns as per government rules.
- General Provident Fund scheme is in practice for the teaching and non-teaching staff members.
- Defined contribution pension scheme (DCPS) for grantable staff who have joined the service after 01/11/ 2005.
- Medical claim facilitated through Joint Director of Higher Education to the Government of Maharashtra.
- Retirement pension as per government rules and regulations.
- Registration fees, TA/DA provides to teaching and non-teaching staff for various workshops arrange by college level and University level.

In addition to these the management gives the following benefits to the employees:

The staff members are felicitated in a function for the sincere discharge of their duties in the College, clearing qualifying examinations like SET/NET, paper presentations at international conferences, publishing books, obtaining M. Phil or Ph. D degree. Welfare measures are taken by the institution, felicitation of staff members for higher academic achievements

**Appraisal System:** The institution follows the performance-based appraisal system (PBAS) developed by UGC and the affiliated university KBC NMU for the promotion of teachers. The college has a separate API-

CAS committee to verify the PBAS forms. After verification by the committee, the Principal recommends the proposals of eligible teachers to the University for Promotion. The filled forms are submitted to HODs concerned with all enclosures for assessment and evaluation. The HODs verify the information and then submit them collectively to the principal with proper remarks. The Principal then verifies the information given and gives his remarks. The evaluation of the teachers' performance is made by HODs concerned and the Coordinator of IQAC. A separate committee is formed to analyze the feedback of the teaching faculty. Online feedback is being collected from students of various classes and feedback is taken from students. Students mention their remarks if any, in the feedback forms. The non-teaching staff submits their filled-in forms to the Office Superintendent, who puts remarks on the forms. These forms are sent to the Principal for further verification and action. The performance of the non-teaching staff is made by collecting information from non-teaching employees in a format provided by the Government of Maharashtra.

## 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

#### Response:

#### Mobilization and Optimal Utilization of Resources:

The college is fully aided by the Govt. of Maharashtra and included under section 2(f) section 12B of the UGC Act, 1956. It is fully eligible to receive the grants under various schemes of UGC. The college mobilizes funds for its regular activities from various agencies. The IQAC and UGC committee always search the new reassures for mobilizing funds and it has developed a systematic procedure for the optimal utilization at these resources. college receives grants from the UGC under General Development Assistance and under various schemes which are utilized for development of infrastructure and educational equipment's as per the guidelines of the UGC. The College receives tuition fee, library fee, gymkhana fee which are utilized by the college as per need. The college receives grants for organizing seminar, workshop, conference from the KBC NMU and Govt. of Maharashtra etc.

The College maintains its infrastructure updated from time to time. It has prepared its policies for effective implementation and optimal utilization of its resources. Officially appointed peons maintain the cleanness of the classroom and campus of the College. Few contractual support staff is appointed through proper channel. The received funds are collected and used through the Cheque, RTGS or NEFT mode. As per the priority and advised of CDC the funds are utilized for infrastructural development and beautification, ICT device and up gradation, student development and necessary equipment for the skill-based courses. Each and every single rupee received, is spent utilized proper channel.

## Financial Audits:

The college has internal and external audit system. The internal audit is done by Registrar and Account Clerk while external audit is carried out by Chartered Accountant appointed by the institution for each financial year. The audited report by the external auditor is placed before the Management in the meeting for vetting and rectification, if any. The remarks given by the auditor are taken into consideration in the next year. In the second stage representative of joint director of higher education, Jalgaon region which go through the audited statements in detail in order to examine the legality of receipt and payments.

The government assessment is carried out by the Joint-Director of Higher Education, the Senior Auditor and audited by the Auditor General of the State periodically. The Annual Audit Statement is regularly submitted to AO/Joint Director, Jalgaon Region, and Government of Maharashtra. The last audit done recently by the senior auditor and Joint Director of Higher Education, Jalgaon, and there were no major objections.

### Response:

In the pursuance for quality assurance, quality up-gradation, assessment and accreditation, and Institutionalization the institution has established the Internal Quality Assurance Cell after first accreditation in the year 2005. IQAC has become valuable in suggesting several quality improvements measures in the institution. The institution has composed the IQAC for planning, supervising, and reviewing various activities like teaching learning, research extension, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. At the commencement of each academic year the IQAC constitutes statutory and non-statutory committees for the smooth functioning of academic, non-academic and support activities for overall development of the students. Institution adopts quality management strategies in all academic and administrative aspects. The IQAC adopts a participatory approach in managing and coordinating all components. As a matter of policy, the IQAC sets broad objectives and chalks out plan of action at the beginning of an academic year towards quality enhancement.

Lecture on familiarizing faculty with ICT Tools and hands on training.
5. **Quality Initiatives:** Since second cycle of the NAAC, IQAC has been promoting the quality culture in overall activities of the college. Therefore, every year, in the initial meetings, IQAC takes review of the status of the teachers' research work and performance such as Ph.D. research publication, MRPs, Research Guidance, Seminar participation and organization etc. As result at present there are 25 faculty members are with Ph.D., MRPs are sanctioned by KBC NMU, ICSSR etc.
6. **Structured feedback and Review of learning outcomes:** Feedback is a vital part of the teaching-learning process. Keeping this view in the center, IQAC has developed well-structured feedback systems. IQAC prepares various feedback forms and collects structured feedback on design and review of syllabus and student feedback on teachers. IQAC prepares an inclusive feedback analysis report and it discuss in the meetings for further improvement and implementation. Student learning outcomes are reviewed through class tests, assignments, class seminars, field projects, review of research papers/books, open book tests, internal assessment tests, and university examinations. University result analysis is made for each semester at the department level and is discussed in IQAC/CDC, meetings for further improvement and implementation.
7. **Other quality measures:** Library and Administrative Services have been computerized. Library is upgraded with **Mastersoft ERP software**. Other software such as **LIBMAN Software**, MOPAC, OPAC etc. are available. **NLIST** facility is prescribed for e-resources. Conducted audits like Academic, Environment and Energy etc.

## **“Blood Donation: Learning to connect to society through education”**

### **Objectives of the Practice:**

- To strengthen closer relations between higher education and communities.
- A hope of life to someone in our blood donation.
- An act of humanity from known to unknown.
- To inculcate the Civic responsibility among the students.

### **The Context:**

Community-based education combines the present education with community service to enhance the learning of the students for civic involvement. The National Service Scheme (NSS) focuses on community improvement through academic programs by organizing the Blood Donation Camp for community service so that students, faculty, and community people can unite between theory and practice, between knowledge and action, and between the resources of Institution and Community improvement.

### **The Practice:**

The National Service Scheme (NSS) unit of our institute organizes Blood Donation Camps in collaboration with the Indian Red Cross Society or Navjeevan Laboratory every year on 8th September in memory of Founder President Hon. Late Appasaheb Bhaskarrao Rajaram Patil. During the last five years, the NSS department has collected several units of blood in collaboration with the Indian Red Cross Society. The Institution aims at ensuring easy availability and adequate supply of safe and quality blood and blood components collected from students, the N.C.C. Unit, teachers, and voluntary blood donors from the community.

The collected blood is stored and transported under the supervision of the trained staff of the Indian Red Cross Society. By preserving this policy, blood transfusion is utilized by needy people in Jalgaon district and the neighborhood.

### **The Evidence of success:**

The practice has made an impact on the community, students, and teachers. Donated blood is being utilized by needy people in the Jalgaon district and the neighboring area. Voluntary blood donation camps have resulted in a great social impact on students as well as teachers. The impact of this practice is apparent in personality development, moral education and civic responsibility among the students towards Institution, communities, and the nation. It has also been observed that students develop managerial ability by organizing such types of programs in the Institution to create social and national unity.

### **Practice 2.**

#### **“Kisan Students Welfare Scheme” (KSWS)**

### **Objectives:**

- To promote the poor and needy students by helping them financially for higher education.
- To bring rural and poor students into the main progressive stream of society.

- To create a new hope of education among rural students.

**Goals:**

- To remove the financial obstacles that speed break the process of education.
- To build confidence among the students for higher education.

**Context:**

The Vision and Mission statements of the Institution emphasize the importance of creating ideal students beneficial to society. Kisan poor students welfare scheme practices the concept of economically poor and needy students. Kisan poor students welfare scheme in which financially poor students are selected. The students are adopted voluntarily by the staff to fulfill their essential academic financial needs like exam fees, admission fees, books and stationery, traveling expenses, etc. Kisan poor student’s welfare scheme committee selects some of the students who are not financially well to take education. This scheme gives them a new opportunity to achieve educational progress. The parents of such students agree to send in their children because of this timely financial help.

**The Practice:**

The staff of the Institution individually agree to provide financial assistance to the economically poor and needy students. For this purpose, a committee has been constituted which identifies such students by taking applications and interviews and then by observing the interest of the students towards higher education and need the financial assistance was given to meet the expenses for exam fee, admission fee, books, and stationary, traveling expenses, etc.

**Evidence of Success:** It has been observed that by helping such needy students their interest in the classroom and performance has been improved. The students are motivated towards higher education.

**Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** Due to rural areas, most of the students belong to farmer and farm working families. More numbers of students are needed for help. Hence the resources are not sufficient till the staff of the college has taken an initiative for partial fulfillment of this help.

**7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness**

**7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words**

**Response:**

The institution focuses keenly on the holistic development of farmers and farm worker children by

providing them every opportunity and resource to facilitate their holistic development. This is one of the most distinctive features of the institution. Hence the name of the institute as a “Kisan”.

In the beginning, the Institution has only Arts and Commerce faculty. The Faculty of Arts has seven subjects for specialization. The special subjects are English, Hindi, Marathi, Geography, History, Politics and Economics. As the time progressed, our founder Chairman Hon. Late Appasaheb Bhaskarrao Rajaram Patil (Ex- M.L.A.) realized the need for Science education and started Science Faculty for educational prosperity for rural students. The faculty of Science comprises Chemistry, Zoology, and Computers as the Special subjects. By preserving an idea of educational progress for rural students, the Institution started Vocational courses Bachelor of Vocational courses Software Development and Soil and water conservation. By realizing the significance of education the institution provides a dedicated facility with a better state of infrastructure that has been established by the institution.

The institute had an intake of around 150 under graduate students of its inception in 1978. Making spectacular growth over the years, now its intake of UG is 1480 and for PG programme are 88. Institution has also run Ph. D. programmes having 21 research scholars are pursuing their degree. Our institution has recognized 02 research laboratories by the affiliating university. The institution has been re-accredited 2nd cycle by NAAC with CGPA 2.40 ‘B’ grade.

As visible from vision and mission statements the institute has been focusing on the holistic development of students while aiming at excellence in education and meeting the quality standards set by accrediting and regulatory bodies. While considering the holistic progress the farmers children the institution applies four components namely the intellectual, social, physical and emotional development.

The Institution only needs to fulfill the educational needs of nearby students. It has been reiterated that the institution is shaping up physically and mentally to the students of rural area. A good yard-stick of institutional success is the alignment of its behavior and initiatives with its vision and mission. It has been clearly mentioned in its vision to educate the rural and urban students. The admission policy is too reflective which suits to its broad vision. The institution is strongly committed towards the youth development.

Realizing the significance of competitive examinations in the era of global competitiveness the department of Politics, competitive Guidance Center, and the Department of Social Science initiated competitive exams for students to introduce career opportunities.

The unit of N.C.C. plays a vital role to make a career for the students who participated in NCC. Since the establishment of NCC unit in the year 1996, hundreds of students have been securing ‘B’ and ‘C’ certificate through the unit. As a result more than 350 students of the institution have achieved remarkable and prestigious ranks and posts in defence services as army, CRPF, SRPF, BSF, State police etc.

To strengthen women empowerment, the institute organizes various activities for girls students such as Yuvati Sabha, Self Defence Training, sexual harassment awareness programme, health checkup camp etc. To support financially to the girls students institute conducts special training on ‘making paper bouquet’.

The Institution is very proud of their involvement regarding community, and Nation. Moreover, the Institution organizes the Blood Donation Camp on 8th September every year in memory of Hob’ble founder Chairman Late MLA Appasaheb Bhaskarrao Rajaram. The institution organizes Blood Donation Camps not only for students and staff but also for all in collaboration with Red Cross Society Jalgaon.

Realizing the special and needful situation during the Covid 19 Pandemic the Institution has organized Special Blood Donation Camp for the needful people on 12.12.2020 in collaboration with the Indian Red Cross Society.

Realizing the economic condition of the institution the College initiated a self-funded policy Kisan Poor Students Welfare Scheme for the help of needy students.

To be intellectual competent morally upright, spiritually inspired and socially committed-they leave footprints of their own wherever they go.
